## **CHANGING DYNAMICS**

Thirty years ago family dinner tables were one of the biggest selling items on the market. Now European research shows that large TVs and reclining viewing chairs have eclipsed functional shared eating tables.

Did you know that modern cars are designed to have food and drink holders that align themselves with dimensions provided by major fast food outlets - really? "Eating dinner at the family dining table is no longer the norm and this trend is only getting worse" - quote from Listener 3<sup>rd</sup> September. In the 2007 New Zealand Children's Food and Drink survey, more than half of the parents said their children ate their main meal in front of the television, computer or play station. They also found that some families didn't own a dinner table and others choose not to eat together: children were left to eat alone while parents watched TV; teenagers often opted to eat alone in their bedrooms.

So what does all of this mean? What impact does it have on children? Often impacts take a generation to come to the forefront but not in this case. Families who eat together overwhelmingly produce children who eat healthier food and have greater academic achievement, lower rates of delinquency and better mental health. Eating together increases family bonds and leads to better communication. There are further studies being carried out on the impact of eating together but the facts are out there.

Much of my generations socialising took place at the dinner table. Often things were unsaid and just modelled at the table by our parents. Fascinating information.

## **ZOO NEWS**

Learning takes shape in many forms and occurs in all environments. We have a close relationship with the Hamilton Zoo and over the years we have helped to design cages for the animals, completed marketing material, and many other things. A lot of the Zoos marketing material involves our students and has found its way into a number of publications including this week's Education Gazette.

## AN INHERENTLY PRACTICAL SUBJECT

Local mathematics educator Dr Nicola Petty was invited by Katy Thorne to join the excursion.

She gave the Papamoa College students a short talk on the importance of statistics in terms of society and citizenship.

"Statistics is an inherently practical subject. All statistical analysis has a real world context, and every statistical analysis is different for that reason. If students are only exposed to well-behaved, clean data like the type they usually get in textbooks, they miss out on part of the adventure of statistical analysis," she says.

Nicola found the talks at both the observatory and zoo to be fascinating and pitched at the right level for the class.

"It was clear that there are large amounts of data collected all the time in various scientific endeavours, and that data analysis and statistics is needed to make sense of it.

"I enjoyed seeing behind the scenes where the food is prepared for the different animals, and could see enormous potential for statistics and operations research there."

## AG DAY TRAINEE JUDGES NEEDED

### Seven Sister Silver Salute

A tearful haka concluded New Zealand's Olympic campaign in the women's rugby sevens competition in Rio. Minutes after going down to Australia in the gold medal match at Deodoro stadium yesterday, the kiwi women, who were tagged as the "Sevens Sisters", gathered on the field to perform an emotional haka in a moving postscript to the tournament. The disappointment was clear on the faces of the team, many of whom had tears flowing down their faces as they performed traditional moves.



They won the silver medal, which the Australian favourites won 24-17. Kiwi captain Sarah Goss said she was "pretty gutted" after her team's loss. "We came out here to win the gold medal and we are still bringing back silver. But silver's still good in New Zealand's eyes and we hope we have still done ham noid" she said.

### New Zealand men's sevens team stunned by Japan and losing sonny bill Williams to injury

The NZ men's sevens rugby team suffer a disastrous start to their Olympics campaign with star player sonny bill Williams suffering a tournament-ending ankle injury in a shock first game defeat to Japan.

The NZL men's sevens team has suffered a cruel triple blow to their Olympics aspirations with a shock loss to Japan in their opening match coming at high cost with both star player Sonny Bill Williams and Joe Webber ruled out of the games after suffering injuries and was driven off on the med-i-cab.



The seriousness of Williams's injury was revealed after the match when NZL Olympics committee announced the All Black star had been ruled out of the games with a partial achilles rupture of his left tendon.

## Lake Work Underway

A large scale restoration of Lake Rotokauri on the outskirts of Hamilton being undertaken by the Waikato District Council is now underway.

One of the first stages of the restoration work has been to install two floating wetlands – a small one (approximately 75m<sup>2</sup>) in a main waterway leading into Rotokauri and a large one (approximately 340m<sup>2</sup>) one in the silt trap that picks up water flow from the Te Rapa area. The floating wetlands were built and installed by Native Awa. The artificial wetlands accelerate the settlement of sediment coming into the catchment and provide bio-filtration and nutrient uptake to help with improving water quality.

Project manager Ben Wolfe from Waikato District Council says the wetlands are more than just the plants taking up nutrients.

“The benefit also comes from the root system of the plants providing a substrate for microorganisms to colonise, which is especially beneficial for bacteria that breakdown waste products. The system acts in a similar way to an aquarium filter, cleaning water through the microbial digestion of organic materials. Additionally the floating wetlands themselves provide habitat for birds and fish as well as providing shade in the summer months,” he says.

The Waikato River Authority funded nearly half a million dollars towards the project in 2015. The improvement of the water quality in Lake Rotokauri is seen as a direct benefit to the Waipa River.

The Little Flower Children's Home in Pedong, India.



The Little Flower Children's Home in Pedong North East India has been providing a safe caring home environment for children for almost 35 years. The children are lovingly cared for by Pastor Jonathan and Usha who care for up to 35 children at a time. The children's home can get very cold in the winter, being in the foothills of the Himalayas and the flooring in the dormitories needs replacing. Additionally new mattresses are needed and some of the bathrooms need upgrading. Financially there is only enough coming in to cover the children's basic needs and education so extra funds are needed to hopefully complete the upgrade at the end of this year. The outside of the buildings have undergone a recent upgrade. It is a beautiful setting, and the forests around this area look remarkably like NZ.

"I became involved in this fundraising effort after staying here for 2 nights. The children have been taught to live a life of gratitude, and are an absolute pleasure to be with. They are a testimony to the love that Jonathon and Usha have poured into them. I now have only email contact with them, but friends of ours in India oversee donations/expenditure and are in regular contact with them. I would like to set up correspondence between the Little Flower residents and our students later in the year. They speak English well as it is compulsory in the schools they attend. 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
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
