STUDENT VOICE


The BOT has received a large number of extremely well written letters from the students of Room 8 expressing their thoughts on how we can improve our school environment.

GENERAL MATTERS

Chicken Pox

Please be aware that we have had a report of a case of chicken pox in one of the classrooms. Some important information has been included below:

Key points to remember

- chickenpox is a common childhood illness caused by a virus.
- it is very easy to catch.
- most cases of chickenpox are mild and children get better completely.
- your child needs to see a doctor if they have a very high fever or are very ill, particularly if they become very drowsy, or are breathing fast or vomiting a lot.
- children with chickenpox need to stay home from school and day care.
- chickenpox can sometimes cause serious complications.

Who is at risk of getting chickenpox?

- You are at risk of getting chickenpox if you have never had chickenpox and haven't had the chickenpox vaccine.
- Chickenpox is more common in children between the ages of 2 and 10 years. If one child in your household gets it, it is almost certain that any others who have never had chickenpox will get it next.

What are the symptoms?

Chickenpox can often start with the following symptoms:

- a fever
- a headache
- a runny nose
- a cough
- loss of appetite
- feeling tired

How is chickenpox spread?

- Chickenpox is very easy to catch (it's highly contagious).
- The chickenpox virus spreads through the air (by coughing and sneezing) and by direct contact with mucus, saliva, or liquid from blisters. You can catch the chickenpox virus from touching clothing or other objects that have the blister liquid on them.
- The incubation period is the time from when your child comes into contact with a
 person with chickenpox, to when the first symptoms appear. The incubation
 period for chickenpox is usually 14 to 16 days but can range from 10 to 21 days.
- A child is infectious 1-2 days before they get the rash until all the blisters have dried up. This usually takes 5 to 7 days.

Should my child with chickenpox stay home?

Children should stay away from day care or school, and public places, while they
are infectious. Once all the spots have formed scabs, your child is no longer
infectious. They may go back to school when the spots are all scabbed over and
dry. This can take around 5-7 days.

Book Shelving

We are looking for parents who would be able to re-shelve the readers that students take home. There are 2 locations, Room 1 and Room 6. Traditionally this job has fallen to senior students, but the growing school roll means that it takes longer than the 5-10 minutes it used to. Shelving could be done in the morning before 9.00 am or before 3.00pm. If you would be able to help with this, please contact Mrs Hill, Room 1.

Our unit focus for this term is making choices. We have been learning about how our choices can impact other people and our environment. We looked at the environment of some of our native birds and how pollution can destroy it. We learnt what an endangered species is, particularly our native Kiwi.

As an art project this week, we used a variety of media to create a picture of a native bird in it's habitat. We learnt to blend watercolour paints and learnt the terms background and foreground. We learnt that if we mix the colours blue and yellow it makes green, and red and yellow makes orange. Our native birds are made by using a collage of felt, feathers, eyes, and foam.

REMINDERS

Carparking

A big challenge for many schools is keeping students safe in and around school carparking. As adults it is our responsibility and a school expectation that we model appropriate safe behaviour at all times.

- Cross the road at the appropriate place beside the entrance gateway.
- Do not park on yellow lines, either beside the school mailbox or beside the entrance gateway.
- If you are walking into the school please follow the footpath and pedestrian crossings, instead of cutting across the carpark, even if you are holding your child's hand.
- Ensure that all your children are entering your vehicle on the correct side of the car. If you need to have children enter from the driver's side please move to a nearby carpark.

Walking

It is great to see an increasing number of children walking after school - some are walking to meet parents/caregivers who have parked away from the congestion of the school gate or some are walking home. Please ensure that you have spoken to your child/children about safe walking on country roads.

- If your child/children need to cross the road to get into a parked car please do not call them across the road, it is more sensible for an adult to cross children safely themselves.
- Remind children about sneaky driveways and how to walk along roads that do not have footpaths e.g. which side of the road should they be walking on.
- At all times students must be demonstrating sensible behaviour as they are still representing Rotokauri School.

If you see unsafe behaviour by students of our school please report this to one of the staff members so that we can use this as a learning opportunity.

Late students

If your child/children arrive after the 9.00 a.m. bell has rung please remind them to go to the office so that their attendance at school can be recorded. They then need to enter their classes with as little disruption as possible as the daily programme will have already started.

Sign-in Book

As a Health and Safety regulation we have a Sign-in Book in the office. If parents/caregivers/visitors enter school during the hours of 9.00 - 2.30 p.m. they must sign in, it does not matter what the reason is or the amount of time spent on the school grounds. If there is an emergency the school needs to account for everyone at the school. Please try to abide by this rule, as it has been noted that a number of parents are forgetting to sign in whilst on school property.




