ROTOKAURI PRACTICE REGISTER AUGUST 2013 <u>EVIDENCE TO SUPPORT THAT ROTOKAURI SCHOOL IS AN</u> INCLUSIVE SCHOOL FOR OUR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

- Rotokauri School has high attendance rates across gender and races.
- There is a belief/expectation that all children will learn and reach their full potential.
- There is a strong student voice through the Student Council and students are often asked to give their views through various consultation processes.
- Students are happy and engaged as reported in student consultation packages.
- We listen to our students and follow up with their wishes e.g. toilets, basketball backboards and IT equipment.
- Continual celebration of all forms of success at assemblies, in newsletters, within the class.
- Our students are proud, confident and comfortable to share with all audiences.
- Our students help to run community events e.g Agricultural Days, Car Shows, end
 of year prizegiving.
- Senior students are involved in a duty system and show pride in keeping the school well maintained.
- Our students actively model our values system, very welcoming of visitors, student ambassadors.

- Older students work with younger students for paired writing.
- Students understand the concept of TEAM Together Everybody Achieves More.
- Students feel comfortable around one another.
- Students are inclusive of people who are different (culture, personality)
- Student/parent/teacher relationships are strong.
- Students are spontaneous and are willing to take risks.
- Students are proud of attending this school. There is a feeling of belonging.
- Students that have left our school return to speak to our students.
- Students flourish in a safe environment.
- Students understand that the staff really do care about them as individuals.
- Students comment about the opportunities that they receive at this school.
- Students have an overall sense of pride and belonging and leave with a series of happy memories. We often talk to the students/staff about providing lasting memories.
- Students in Year 7/8 have strong leadership skills and often excel in those types of roles at high school.
- Students have a sense of belonging and therefore do not vandalize the school.

- Parents do not have to sign in and out of the school.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY STRATEGIC PLAN

We are currently putting together an IT strategy for 2014. We are really pleased with the progress we have made this year and are looking at supplying more IT hardware in the near future for our students. I'm not sure if you saw the Sunday programme a few weeks ago that showed a school in Auckland that had introduced a policy that students had to bring their own devices to school. It was an interesting documentary because the school was decile one. The school had asked all of their parents to supply a device for their child / children. Many families obviously could not afford to buy an iPad outright but the school had got around this problem by arranging a leasing agreement whereby parents paid less than \$4.00 a week.

Bring your own devices is becoming more common in New Zealand schools and there are many positives reasons for doing this.

Students want very specific feedback in relation to what they are doing and what they need to do next. (Next learning step.)

The feedback needs to make the students reflect on their learning.

The feedback needs to be in relation to real authentic learning situations.

What sort of feedback works for the learner at Rotokauri School?

The feedback needs to be timely. As close to the completion of the activity as possible.

The students need to feel as if the feedback will make a difference and doesn't just follow a system of praise for the sake of it.

The feedback will be twice as powerful if the parents receive the same information.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council are in the process of completing another survey of our students in relation to sports equipment. In our next newsletter we will be able to give you the results of what our students would like. Our Council have made requests in the past in relation to upgrading pool changing facilities and increasing of IT equipment. Because of the way they have produced their survey and presented their information to school management and the board they have proved to be very successful representing the student's wishes.

BALLOT FORMS AVAILABLE

The Board have stipulated that 20 spaces will be available for students turning 5 between 1st November 2013 and 1st December 2014. If you know someone who has a child who turns 5 during that set time period and they want to come to our school make sure they get a ballot form from our office. All ballot forms need to be returned to the office by 3.15 pm Friday, 20th September.

UNDER PRESSURE

There is an excellent article in the New Zealand Listener (24th August) regarding children. school and stress. Although the article is mainly in relation to NCEA there are passages that talk about National Standards and the added stress that it is placing on students and teachers. Learning should be fun and enjoyable. It should be based on students being engaged and having an enquiring mind. It shouldn't be about every child getting above the standard as a sign of their personal success. National Standards can take the joy of learning away from some students (if as parents and teachers we let it). Some students may never reach the standard but they are learning and making progress and that is what is really important. As teachers and parents we need to make sure that we are supporting our students, not pressuring them to the point where they disengage themselves from learning because they view themselves as failures. Quite by chance I came across a quote from an educational leadership book which I think sums a lot of things up. "When parents/teachers treat children like performance machines or place their academic achievement above other values...children not only are stressed but also may feel that their best personal qualities are not valued by others. Children are socially skilled, deeply loyal, funny, feisty, caring and imaginative but may never come to value these qualities or see them as anywhere near the core of their being. In these circumstances, children are also more likely to view others in terms of their achievement and see them as threats or competitors. They suffer a diminished sense of others and themselves".

ENTERPRISE

Financial literacy means teaching students about skills that they can use for the rest of their lives. At Rotokauri we teach financial literacy through our yearly enterprise programme. Financial literacy works best when set in a real environment and not from the theoretical pages of a book. This year our students will once again be working as classes to feed and water all the visitors to the Rotokauri Car Show. This event will be held on 10th November 2013. Students very quickly find out about their marketing skills and the laws of demand, supply and price. They also learn how important customer service is if they want to establish repeat business. Please make sure that you tell everyone about our Car Show so that it can be a real success for our students.

CARSHOW HELPERS REQUIRED

CAR RESTRAINTS

A new law will be coming into effect as from the 1st November as part of the Land Transport Road User Amendment Act. Basically, children up to their 7th birthday need to be in an approved child restraint. This will have an impact on the way that we transport our junior students to sporting and cultural activities. I would say that very few people have approved car restraints for children of that age and therefore we will most likely have to use buses more often.

QUALITY OF SPEECHES

The quality of speeches this year was excellent and every single student who stood up in front of their class should be commended. A little story that I would like to share with you revolves around our value of persistence. For years Simeon Kahuroa had a goal of trying to win the Rotokauri Speech competition. Each year he would come close but would be pipped at the post by another student. Not deterred by this and showing a great deal of persistence and skill he wrote a tremendous speech this year, which won not only our school competition but also the inter-school competition. MATHLETICS

We have spent time consulting with students, parents and staff regarding Mathletics. Feedback has been very positive and therefore as a school we will be doing the Mathletics programme in 2014. As stated in previous newsletters the school will pay \$10 per student for 2014. Parents need to pay \$20 per child attending Rotokauri School. For us to make a smooth transition into this maths programme we need to get all the money in by the end of the year. Now we realise that the end of the year is leading into Christmas which can be expensive. Therefore, we are starting to take the money for Mathletics from next Monday. This will give people the opportunity to pay early and seemed to be a very positive move and worked well for our Swim Safe Programme. We need all money for Mathletics in by 20th December. If you want to pay this off in instalments between now and then please see Sharon at the office.

CARPARK SAFETY

Over the last few weeks we have noticed that parents and other adults picking up students have not been using the car park correctly. This may be because of the weather conditions but it doesn't change the fact that they are endangering the safety of all the students and parents that use the car park.

The only place that people should drop off or pick up students is in the drop off zone. Presently we have parents who are trying to drop off and pick up students where ever they please, often requiring them to do some highly dangerous manoeuvres. The other area of concern is adults walking their children across the car park without using the pedestrian crossing. Please ensure you are following the rules that were implemented to keep everyone safe.

DENTAL NURSE

The dental nurse will be at Rotokauri School to check all the children's teeth from Thursday, 17 October to Friday, 1 November.

KEEP NEW ZEALAND BEAUTIFUL


