PARENT TEACHER ASSOCIATION (PTA)

BUDDY SYSTEM

KEEPING OUR STUDENTS SAFE AFTER SCHOOL

Dr Kate Niederer is an experienced gifted education researcher, lecturer and practitioner. She has worked at all levels in gifted education, from specialist teaching of gifted children to involvement in policy making and national level research. She was Deputy Director for the George Parkyn National Centre for Gifted Children in New Zealand and in 2005 was appointed Assistant Director at the National Academy for Gifted and Talented Youth at Warwick University. Kate led the team that wrote the Primary Guidance in Gifted Education document that went out to 21,000 schools in England and has presented extensively both nationally and internationally.

She now works for Cognition as a consultant, with a particular focus on gifted education. She is regional coordinator for the Northern region for the Te Toi Tupu Gifted and Talented PLD programme, works with schools in Auckland to provide PLD in gifted education, and continues to manage the TKI Gifted and Talented Online site and accompanying mailing list.
