S.C.E.N.T Project

If you have been down to the school field recently you will have seen a lot of activity happening. The PTA are creating a Sensory Classroom and Educational Nature Trail (SCENT). There is a number of materials that the PTA is on the lookout for so that the project can be completed. If you are able to help sourcing any of these items please let the PTA know via their email. The PTA need –

- ponga logs, large bamboo, or other natural materials that might be suitable to be used to make a screen from the neighbouring property
- rocks a trailer load of basketball size rocks
- old fence battens
- used paving stones about 50 (not cobblestones)
- 3 or 4 concrete farm troughs large or small, cracked or damaged is fine, not for holding water just soil
- 2 or 3 concrete culvert pipes
- Steel reinforcing mesh one sheet, rusty or damaged is fine
- 44 gallon drums 4 or 5, good quality appreciated
- Rope 50 0 75mm diameter, at least 100 metres required


