PRINCIPAL'S PIECE

Thank you to all the parents/caregivers that were available to attend Student Led Conferences earlier this week. We hope that you enjoyed being part of your child's learning journey this year and are aware of the goals they are hoping to achieve by the end of the year.

Also, thank you to the parents/caregivers that have updated their contact details (e.g. address and phone number) for cases of emergency and to the parents / caregivers for bringing in evidence of your child's measles immunisation. We believe that there have been 7 measles cases identified in the Waikato and therefore we will keep you updated as soon as any information is made available to the school. This is especially important for families that are not immunised, pregnant women and people that have low immunity due to illness. This Saturday the ballot information for 2020 will be advertised. The BOT have decided to ballot for Year 1 and 8 students, so if you know of anyone that is interested please direct them to the Waikato Times advertisement or get them to contact the office. If you are also aware of any families living in-zone that could potentially be enrolling at Rotokauri School in the future could you please ask them to

contact the school office, as this will ensure that our records are correct for future planning.

Agricultural Day

Due to the number of entries for the animals at Agricultural Day and the responses to our survey in regards to the Indoor Activities, both these parts of the day will go ahead as planned. However, there will be changes to the Indoor Activities. Thank you to all the families that responded to our survey and shared some valuable feedback. Staff will be providing families with the Indoor Activities booklet next week.

Please provide us with some feedback which will assist us with further planning for the Indoor Activities

- Have an environmental focus.
- Reinforce to parents that the kids are meant to do much of the planning and preparing.
- Have some easier options e.g. buttonhole flower arrangement.
- Too many activities children need to do less so they can take more time with presentation.
- Only one day not multiple days.
- Maybe have a wearable art challenge or a challenge for innovative reuse of plastic.
- Some activities are costly, maybe have 3 compulsory.
- Activities don't change much over the years.
- I enjoy food and farming tasks. Kids love Lego building.
- Takes a lot of work and money to participate.
- It costs to prepare the crafts then the kids don't use the materials for what was discussed, but really there is no learning if all the kids are doing is carrying out Mum's instructions. Would like to see curriculum and creativity.
- Do 4 activities, allow 30 minutes for 'easy' activities and maybe 45 minutes for 'hard' activities. Choose activities that can have some prep done beforehand and require components that are easy for parents to supply e.g items found in most households.
- Since you have spread them over a few days I now find it far less stressful. Finding flowers at that time of year isn't the easiest. We are a country school and this has always been a part of country schools.
- Current format is fine, it's more the timing it is difficult to get things organised the first week back after school holidays.
- Feel it is hard if you don't have the resources at home.
- Struggle with fresh flower component.

- Feel that over the last couple of years there has been less options for the garden/flower themed activities and is more just craft options. A selection of both to choose from would be neat. Having choices for the likes of tray gardens maintains that country/Ag Day feel for those that can and want to do them.
- Try and use what resources you have at school and let the child decide what they want to make or build.
- Think giving the students options of 5 6 activities to choose from and asking them to complete 3 – 4 of the options gives a chance for different talents to shine through. Think that animal and plant based ideas are great as they fit well with the Ag Day concept.
- Good that most of the work is done during the time allowed so that its students work not parents.
- Maybe have a look at the instructions and rules as the judges don't always follow these.
- Children enjoy Ag Day and creating things to be judged, but find it wasteful and sometimes expensive depending on the creations.
- Stressful for parents when activities need to be started or completed at home, and resources need to be provided and transported. I like the activities done in class. Sometimes you can see the parents have done the work instead of the child.
- Love that parents weren't able to assist the kids in the class as this made it more equal.
- Would be good to see some more options available to give the students more choice.

Are there any other ideas which you would like us to consider?

- Collage, handwriting, buttonhole flower arrangement, cake/cupcake making, flax weaving, something that celebrates our natural environment, maybe something with a Tainui influence.
- Inclusion of any activities or experiences that are linked to agriculture and retain the purpose of the day.
- There is no need to have indoor activities on Ag Day any more as there are few animals and lots of children inside. Traditionally the inside activities were busy work designed to occupy the few.
- Colouring competition, poems about farm animals, design your own tractor (could be a drawing or made out of cardboard).
- With electronics a big component of the children's development and skill set maybe something to do with media? A short film to do with agriculture, these could play on loop in the classroom.
- A talent quest.
- Environmental science projects.
- Cultural activity e.g. flax weaving.
- Origami farm animals.
- Trash to fashion.
- Fun activity like making a scarecrow.
- Doing something collective e.g. a class creative competition.

- Painting or general art activity.
- Sand saucers.
- Vegetable growing competition.

In Room 7 We Have Been Using DMIC to Learn Math


What is DMIC?

DMIC is an acronym for **Developing Mathematical Inquiry Communities**. In short it is an introduction of a new concept in Mathematical thinking in the classroom; instead of teaching maths through **Ability Grouping**, we are using **Social Grouping**. This means that the students are teaching each other with the teacher simply facilitating the focal topic for that day (the Maths Story), which the students are expected to break down completely before completing or tackling the Maths part of the lesson.

We start with the Classroom Norms:

These set the **expectations for each lesson** and are decided in the very first lesson by the whole class so that each student has ownership of these expected **Norms**. They are then displayed within the classroom and are referred to at the start of each lesson, discussed so that everyone is on the same page. They are also used throughout the lesson if there are any students not following the **Classroom Norms**, (Prompting).

Below is a sample of some possible Classroom Norms.



Room 7, Classroom Norms!

- 1: Everyone is included; NO PASSENGERS!
- 2: Positive attitude; RESPECT EACH OTHER!
- 3: One speaker at a time; BE A GOOD LISTENER!
- 4: TRY YOUR BEST!
- 5: Make eye contact with the speaker; STAY FOCUSED!

It is important to point out here, that these **Classroom Norms** can also be used throughout the entire day, not just for any DMIC lessons.



Here we see the children begin to analyse the problem, before trying to solve the math.


And in this picture we see the children working on strategies and ideas to share ways of solving the problem. They can us images, addition/subtraction, multiplication/division, fractions, or a whole range of strategies.





Finally, once everyone in their group understands the strategies used to solve the problem, they then share their results to the larger group. They also have to justify their thinking during this process.

DMIC promotes the principle of AKO, or reciprocal learning. This is 'sharing the work, learning together, growing together'.




