PRINCIPAL'S PIECE

Welcome back to Term 4, we are now counting down to the end of the school year. During the holidays school was a hive of activity with -

- teachers preparing for the new term
- cleaners spring cleaning the school buildings
- our school caretaker spraying, laying new matting under the swings and waterblasting
- contractors replacing the roof on Rooms 1 & 6, as well as changing all light fittings to LED and installing air conditioning units in the administration block. This has been part of our Ministry funded 10 year property plan. Thank you to Brad Kells and his helper Josh for painting the Room 7 & 8 block roof.
- The Atmosphere School Holiday programme operating over the holiday period

Well we started the term with an ERO visit, Ag Day and Thank Your Cleaner Day. Thank you to all the parents that came along to the Parent Voice meeting with ERO and shared their experiences with the ERO ladies. Throughout their visit they saw and heard from staff, students and parents about the things that make Rotokauri School special for the majority of our families. As with all schools not everyone feels positively about everything that is happening at our school. On our school website is the school's Concerns Procedure and I would strongly advise parents that have issues/concerns to make themselves familiar with the process that needs to be followed. This process begins with the classroom teacher, rather than discussions in the community. Making the school aware of concerns is the first step in resolving these.

Thank you to the families that made Ag Day a positive experience for their children. Participation in these opportunities is part of your child's learning journey and encouraging them to be Active Learners is one of our school values. It was lovely to see the commitment and effort that had gone into caring for and working with the lambs and goat. Being rewarded for this with a ribbon is quite significant for children. The parents must be commended for supporting their children with the rearing of animals. I was impressed with the quality of some students work in the classrooms – we really do have some very creative students. We would appreciate some feedback from parents/whaanau in regards to Ag Day, as we were guided by feedback received from parents earlier in the year when preparing the day. A short survey can be completed online – we would like responses received by 1st November. You will receive an email about this. Thank Your Cleaner Day was an opportunity for the staff and students to acknowledge and value the work that these wonderful people do every week. To Ash and Romila we say thank you for keeping our school looking so good. The cards and gift presented to them were greatly appreciated.

The final term of the year comes with a lot of decision making – class lists, staff placement in classes, stationery and strategic planning. Staff are currently writing reports for the students in their classes, are preparing for senior camp, are practicing for schoolwide athletics and participating in professional development based on Mathematics. Next week we also have a visit from the Ministry Property advisers as they begin their planning stages for the two new classrooms which they have allocated for Rotokauri School. This initial visit is to determine what types of structures these will be and where they will be placed. Another busy term ahead and exciting times.
