

### PRINCIPAL'S PIECE

I hope that everyone enjoyed a relaxing Queen's Birthday long weekend.

As New Zealand potentially heads into Level 1 of the lockdown we have started to make some changes within the school. Our sandpits are now all open for the children but we are encouraging physical distancing with limited numbers playing at each time, Kapa Haka will begin this week and so will our formal assembly on Friday, however both these events will be limited to 100 students (e.g. junior and senior school separate). Therefore, on Friday the junior school assembly will be from 2.15 – 2. 35 p.m. and the senior assembly will be from 2.35 – 2.55 p.m.

At Rotokauri School we take health and safety very seriously, which is why we carry out regular emergency drills to practise our procedures. Teachers talk to the students about these procedures so they become familiar with them. Yesterday the school completed a lockdown drill. All students, staff and visitors on-site were safely accounted for. Everyone did extremely well and responded to instructions. Ka pai.

Lockdown drills are carried out twice a year. On hearing the lockdown signal (10 bells), students and teachers remain in their classrooms, or make their way quickly to the nearest classroom if they are outside. Doors are locked and blinds are pulled down. Students and teachers assemble on the floor in a safe place, as silently as possible. When the all clear bell is rung all students and staff assemble on the school field for a roll call. Communication between the school and the community in a lockdown will take place via Facebook and SchoolStream to keep parents fully informed and to keep phone lines free for communication with outside agencies. Please ensure that you have access to one or the other forms of notification (Facebook / SchoolStream).

#### **Lunch Orders**

Thank you to the families that followed the guidelines around ordering lunches during the first two weeks back at school. The PTA lunches will resume next Monday 8<sup>th</sup> June but will be limited to pies and sausage rolls only. The full menu will be available from 15<sup>th</sup> June. The online lunch ordering system resumed this week – the company were asked to inform all past customers of this date.

We are very fortunate that our wonderful PTA volunteers organise the lunch ordering service every Monday. Just a reminder about what is available and the cost:

Pies (large) \$3.50 each – mince, mince & cheese, potato top

Small items \$2.00 each - mince pie, sausage roll

Sushi (4 piece) \$4.00 – chicken salmon

Sushi (8 piece) \$7.00 - chicken & vegetables

Subway \$6.00 – ham, beef, turkey

Lunch orders need to be placed before 8.55 a.m. in the student foyer.

## Covid-19 Level 2 Guidelines for Sports Coaches/Managers Rotokauri School Grounds

- Coaches and managers to sign in and hand sanitise at the school office (before and after practice).
- Any spectators must sign in and hand sanitise at the school office (before and after practice).
- Teams must use only allocated equipment. All equipment used must be disinfected at the conclusion of each practice. Bibs must be washed after each practice and game.

- The associated sporting bodies may have additional procedures that must be followed.

#### **VOLCANOES**

A volcano is a break in the crust of a surface that allows hot lava, ash, and gases to escape from below. Beneath Earth's surface lies hot rocks, these hot rocks are called magma. When the magma reaches the Earth's surface an eruption happens. The word volcano comes from the name Vulcan, a legend about a Roman God of Fire.

Not all volcanoes are the same. Depending on how they go bang will tell us what kind of volcano they are. There are three types of volcanoes. They are: Shield Volcanoes, Cinder Cone Volcanoes and Stratovolcano. A volcano can be active, dormant or even extinct.

The land we live on is broken into pieces called plates. If plates bump into each other different things can happen. A mountain may be pushed a little higher, there may be an earthquake or a tsunami or maybe a volcano will erupt. Many of Earth's eruptions happen on the edge of a plate called the Pacific Plate. This area is called the Ring of Fire. New Zealand sits to the left of the Ring of Fire and Indonesia is a string of Island that is also in the Ring of Fire. Indonesia has more erupting volcanoes than anywhere

else on earth. But, the most volcanic activity is not actually on Earth it is on lo, one of Jupiter's Moons.

Volcanoes are very interesting because they are made beneath the surface, and then they appear on top of the surface in different ways. They are interesting because they are both found here on earth and on other planets as well. They are interesting because they have also been around for many years and will continue to be around for many years to come.
