COOL SCHOOLS

Thank you to all the parents that attended the Cool Schools parent evening on Thursday 13th March. For those of you who couldn't attend this meeting we are trying to organize another evening in Term 2. This evening will also involve giving you feedback in relation to maths, which is our target area in 2014.

Cool Schools is about peer mediation, it's about giving students a series of skills that they will be able to use for the rest of their lives. All of our classes have been involved in a sequence of lessons over the last month that gives them a very good understanding of how the programme works. Twenty four student mediators have been selected and have undergone training from an outside facilitator. Part of the mediators training programme involved discussing and refining the sorts of skills they would need to be effective. Here are the mediators responses to what they need to be - trustworthy, show fairness, be compassionate, be approachable, be confident, be good listeners, have the ability to solve problems, have a clear voice, be polite, be firm and yet polite, show the school values and show a degree of confidentiality.

Part of the training our mediators underwent was in relation to listening skills. Our students came up with the following in relation to good listening skills - eye contact, using your ears, the importance of body language, facing the speaker, non-verbal feedback (smiling, nodding, laughing with them not at them), asking the right sorts of questions.

The sort of guestions our students will be asking to get to a harmonious resolution are -

- What happened?
- What were you thinking at the time?
- What were you feeling at the time?
- What do you need to do to sort this out?
- What can we do to help solve this problem?

What we have noticed about this programme is that the students come up with the ideas to solve the issues which is so much more powerful than a teacher telling them what to do.

The school has received a very good ERO review and we will be able to share this positive news with our community in our next newsletter. Our success is down to relationships and the way everyone works for the common good of the students. Thank you to all the parents who participated in the February review.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council are elected by their peers at the start of each year. They meet with me most Friday lunchtimes. Tayne Matheson, Crystal Withey, Te Waiti Rawiri and Sarah Miller have already put a plan together to improve the pool facility for next season. The feedback they have received from the students is that there needs to be storage space for their clothing while having lessons at the pool. The Student Council have already measured up the required storage area and will be passing this onto the Board to action, if possible.

BIKE RIDE

A couple of years ago we used to do fun bike rides. We'd select a place and time and away we'd go. People enjoyed them because it was a great way to do a bit of family bonding. This year before we all get busy with winter sports and while the weather is still good we have decided to have a fun bike ride on Sunday 30th March. We will meet outside the restaurant at Hamilton Gardens at 9.30am. The bike ride will go from the Gardens to Fairfield Bridge and back using as much of the river walkways as possible. Because this is an out of school event we ask that parents are responsible for their own children's safety. You should make sure that an adult is riding with your child/children and that they are responsible for the condition of their child's bike and equipping them with an appropriate helmet.

SCHOOL DONATIONS

Thank you to all the families who have paid their school donation in full. We have not raised the school donation in seven years. The school donation is \$100 per child, with no family paying more than \$250.

While there are many positives to being a high decile school the major drawback is that the government provides us with limited funds in comparison to low decile schools and this is why our PTA is continually in fundraising mode. Our school donations are vital if we want to provide a top class learning facility for our students. Some high decile schools now employ professional fundraisers to help support the school financially. FIRE DRILLS

We do three fire drills every year with our students. It's important that our students understand what to do in the eventuality of a fire. At our last practice we managed to get all of students and staff out of the rooms and assembled onto the courts in two minutes. While the students were there I asked how many of them had a family fire plan. Less than 20% of our students had a household fire plan in place. Everybody thinks that it won't happen to them but I got a reality check the other week when my neighbour's house caught on fire. It only takes five minutes to have a chat with your family and discuss a plan of action should a fire eventuate.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION

Our school has chosen to provide Religious Instruction for many years. The reason we run it is two fold. It is a quality programme that supports the value system of the school and our parents are asked every year if they want this to continue and the vast majority do.

NATIONAL STANDARDS

I have never been an advocate of National Standards as many of you will have already worked out. A one size fits all that was ill conceived and poorly trialled with very little time for consultation was always going to fail. This is just a small snippet from the latest Principals Magazine but shows some interesting trends in terms of PISA testing over the past 9-12 years. At Rotokauri School we are trying to retain professional creativity and keep the curriculum as wide as possible so that we can find what really inspires our students to achieve to the best of their ability. It's vital that students never lose the love of learning.

Lessons for our Government

In view of these clear patterns in PISA scores, over 12 years, an outcome which many of us were predicting, the lessons for our Government and NZQA should be clear. Neither National Standards in primary schools nor NCEA in secondary schools will raise performance levels. As high-stakes events, they generate more testing, less creative teaching, obvious grade inflation, less "stretching" of brighter students, less cooperation between schools, lower achievement levels and larger gaps between high and low-performing schools - to name a few of the negative consequences. A "one size fits all" system which sets arbitrary and vaguely-worded standards, which are too easy for some, and too hard for others, ignores the natural individual differences that exist between students. It often fails to challenge the high-fliers, as they slow down once they have achieved enough credits - and the data do show the declines are greater at the top. Moreover, it does not solve the problem of the under-achieving tail. In fact as the league tables start to bite, there is a usually a drift away from low socio-economic schools, which lose their reputation, their best students and teachers, resulting in a loss of morale and a real problem in attracting experienced, committed teachers. The gap between schools only gets wider. In any new policy, there are some winners and some losers. Using our own figures, our Minister has created an illusion of more winners. In an international context, using assessments that search more broadly, we expose the gaps in our students' knowledge and skill, and the upshot is that we are actually falling back. Many of these consequences have been documented overseas before, but our policy makers ignore them.

Is there any other possible explanation for these falling scores? They are unlikely to reflect changes in curricula, or methods, as the declines cut across all three subjects, and what curriculum reforms there were in these countries had little in common. Nor has there been any sudden, nation-wide change in teacher training policies. There have been no common funding policy changes in these five nations. The kinds of moderation of school-based assessments vary from one country to another, from tight exam-based systems, to group consensus methods, to weak post-hoc moderator visits. None appears to halt the slide.

The common denominator in all five of the selected nations is a policy which requires schools to report the numbers of students achieving in relation to a set of vaguely-worded standards, with or without internal assessments, and the results are then publicised in the form of league tables, making it all high stakes. The impact of such a policy, changes the behaviour of teachers and students in such a way that the long-term effects on achievement levels is consistently negative. In a naive push for greater accountability, we are damaging the fabric of our hitherto world-renowned education system. No country that has adopted a policy of highstakes SBA has produced an improvement in achievement levels. Anyone can confirm these figures by checking the reports on the Internet. As professionals, teachers are charged to give highest priority to the needs of their students. If we persist with these ill-starred standards-based schemes, we will surely be neglecting those needs. As a nation, too, we are now heavily involved in a race to the bottom.

ATTENTION!!! VIOLIN LESSONS NOW AVAILABLE AT ROTOKAURI SCHOOL!!!

My name is Clara Lange and I am an experienced teacher of music having taught violin, piano and guitar privately and as an itinerant teacher in schools to pupils from pre-school age through to adults in one on one and group teaching roles for seven years. I have trained in classical violin, piano and contemporary singing. My music qualifications include Advanced Certificate Violin, Grade 7 Piano and Theory and a Diploma of Performance in vocals. I include a range of styles in my teaching, having had wide experience and the enjoyment of playing and improvising in celtic, blues, rock and jazz bands over the years.

When: If your child is interested in learning the violin, I will be offering 30 minute lessons on

Fridays (during the lunch hour) once a week. Start date: 5th May

Where: At Rotokauri School Minimum age: 7 years.

Payment: Lessons are billed per term, full payment is required before the first lesson, by cheque or internet banking. Cost will be dependent on numbers of children interested in learning. Individual lessons will cost \$25 or lessons in a group of 2 or 3 will be \$18 each with the added benefit of no extra travel for parents/caregivers. The start date is week 1, Term 2. Students sign up on a term by term basis.
