CONSULTATION PROCESSES

Rather than deal with paper and work out results manually we have hired the services of monkey.com to host 2 surveys (community and student consultation). If you go to <u>www.rotokauri.school.nz</u> you will see the two surveys we have commissioned. We would appreciate it if you and your child / children can fill these out. As this is a fairly new process we are going to increase the timeframe for completion of these surveys. The cut-off date for completing these will be Wednesday 2nd July.

We will be advertising this new system of consultation over the coming weeks in the hope that even more students and parents will take up the opportunity to have their say. Looking forward to sharing some of the results with you early in Term 3.

SHARING EVENING

On Wednesday 18th June we would like as many parents as possible to come and join us for a sharing of information evening. We will discuss and present information on Cool Schools which we began in March this year. We would also like to share information about Mathletics and maths in general. This is a great opportunity for you to hear and see what is happening at our school and the ways you can assist your child with their learning.

ROTOKAURI SCHOOL

The Board invites applications from parents who wish to enrol their child, who will be turning **5** between **25 June 2014** and **7 October 2014**, at Rotokauri School. They have decided that there are **5 spaces** available for out of zone students turning five between those dates. The Board have also decided there is space available for **2 - Year 1's** (born August 2008 to October 2008), **2 - Year 2's** and **3 - Year 6's** for the remainder of the 2014 school year.

Enrolment at the school is governed by an enrolment scheme, details of which are available from the school office. Application forms are available at the school office from Tuesday, 3rd June or phone (07) 8495 068.

The deadline for receipt of applications for out of zone places is 3.15 pm, Friday, 13th June. If the number of out of zone applications exceeds the number of places available, students will be selected by ballot. If a ballot is required it will be held on Monday, 16th June. Parents will be informed of the outcome of the ballot by 18th June 2014.

ILLNESS

Winter months bring with them additional health issues. Many parents make enquiries regarding the time off a child needs to recover from illness. The best thing to do as a parent for peace of mind is ask your doctor. However the following recovery times are used by some institutions:

| Conjunctivitis | Until eye discharge has CEASED. | |

| Whooping Cough | For FIVE days AFTER antibiotic treatment commenced. | |
| Mumps | For NINE days or until swelling has gone. | |
| Chicken Pox | For SEVEN days from the ONSET of the rash and scabs dry. | |
| School Sores | Until 24 hours AFTER antibiotics started. | |
| Streptococcal Throat | For 24 hours FROM commencement of treatment. | |
| Influenza | Infectious for up to SEVEN days. Restrict contact until well. | |




SOW SPRING VEGGIES


