FEEDBACK FROM EMBLEM DISCUSSION

We shared with our community and students the changes that we would like to make to the school emblem. They reflect changes in philosophy of education at our school. Thank you to all the students who gave their views about the emblem during class discussions over the last 2 weeks. A number of the student's thoughts proved to be very insightful and we will follow up on their thoughts during this term with the staff.

PARENTS' TECH TRIP

Thank you to the parents who took the opportunity to visit our students at Hamilton Junior High last week. Tech has changed dramatically over the last few years to encompass best learning and teaching practices. Students are more in charge of their own learning rather than being hand fed information. Each project has an overall learning objective with a series of learning stages. This is fairly typical of what you might see over a six week learning sequence in the tech department:

- 1. Problem What do we already know? Gather information and organise.
- 2. Identify the problem/s.
- 3. Generate ideas to solve problems.
- 4. Decide on a plan.
- 5. Implement the plan.
- 6. How well did I/we do, evaluate.

- 7. Share/communicate with an audience.
- 8. What have we learned from these experiences?

Often students will collaborate with others when going through learning sequences and the beauty of this inquiry collaboration system is that it can be used across curriculum areas. Often the teachers at Hamilton Junior High will work together e.g. producing a musical instrument at hard materials that can be used in music.

We are in discussions at present with the Tech department to see if we can have students stay for longer at Tech in Term 4.

It was fantastic to see our students using a variety of problem solving strategies to overcome problems when designing, constructing, trialling and evaluating their projects.

While on our website have a look around at the other tabs as well e.g. classrooms or educational videos. You will have noticed our website has come a long way in the last 18 months. Many of our ideas have come from students, staff and parents. We are always open to new ideas being implemented.

ACTS OF KINDNESS

During the last part of Term 2 we really pushed the concept of Acts of Kindness. It's a real sign of maturity and empathy when you do something for someone else without the expectation that you benefit from it in some way. Our students know that helping people is just the right thing to do. Teachers can write down Acts of Kindness and put them into a special box which is situated in the student's administration entrance. Mr Watkins has organized a ride in a hot rod car for a lucky recipient whose name will be drawn out of the box at the end of the term. If you see a child perform an act of kindness please feel free to let us know.

COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

Student and community consultation is an important part of our school culture. We encourage our students and parents to have a say in the future planning of our school, whether it be in curriculum or property.

During August and September parents will have the opportunity to answer questions in relation to school culture, curriculum, supporting the school, school administration and legislation.

We encourage as many people as possible to take the opportunity to give the Board feedback.

PARENT TEACHERS ASSOCIATION (PTA)

The money will be used to develop a veranda area outside Room 8/library area. Without the PTA's support this would have been a difficult project for the school to undertake.

POLICEMAN JACOB GOLDSMITH

Many of you using the car park over the last couple of weeks would have noticed the presence of Constable Goldsmith. He is giving us some advice on how we can make our car park and road crossing safer. He is also looking at the driving habits of parents, caregivers and the community when using the school carpark and Rotokauri Road. Two things that he has helped us implement quickly which will make crossing of the road safer for the 15 students who cross daily are —

- There will be a meeting point designated by 2 fluoro coloured poles. These will
 mean that staff and parents who are coming into the car park are aware of children
 needing to cross the road. He has also given us permission to put cones out on
 the road. The students have been told that this is not a sign that cars will
 automatically stop for them.
- Constable Goldsmith has also given each student that crosses the road a fluoro jacket free of charge. I really hope that parents of children who cross the road make their children wear these.

We would like to thank Constable Goldsmith for spending most of last Thursday afternoon educating those 15 students on road safety skills.

WHAT MAKES KIDS HAPPY?

As parents we often wonder what makes children happy. At school we are often asking ourselves the same questions. Some of the items below are difficult for a school to create and this is why education in the 21st century is such a partnership.

According to a number of websites these seven concepts will create not only happy

According to a number of websites these seven concepts will create not only happy children but allow them to grow into happy adults.

- 1. <u>They eat on time</u>. Sounds simple doesn't it? Feeding children at regular intervals means that their growing brains receive energy. When kids are fed they are calm and satisfied and so therefore experience greater happiness.
- 2. <u>They get constant sleep.</u> A constant sleep time and period of sleep is important for children. It gives their bodies and minds a chance to recharge. Lack of sleep causes children to become cranky and they will often lack the ability to concentrate, which impacts on their ability to learn. Children that are well rested generally will wake up and embrace the new day.
- They play without instruction. Unstructured playtime seems to be a lost art these days. Years ago children would be outside playing all day making up their own fun games. These days children are often scheduled for play, the play is often planned by adults with little input from students. Often high tech toys do the playing for the children. Play is good for a child's socialisation and creativity. Through play they learn to work their own problems out and therefore feel a sense of achievement.
- **4.** They are allowed to express emotions. Children do not have vocabulary to express all their thoughts in a way that parents can understand and support. Children need to be allowed to express their emotions in a way that stops them clamming up and internalizing their emotions.
- **They get to make choices.** Children actually have very little control over their lives. They are constantly being told what to do and when to do it and even how to do it. A little bit of control allows them to help improve their decision making skills, which are vital to their health and well-being in their future.
- **They feel heard.** Children are very intuitive. They understand if you are on autopilot and not really listening to them. When children know you are listening they feel more connected and therefore this improves their confidence and self-esteem.
- 7. They experience unconditional love. Children learn through trial and error that's what childhood is all about. Children very rarely make the same mistake twice. We need to show support when they make mistakes. Children need to know love is unconditional. In saying that when your child makes a mistake stand beside them not in front of them. They need to know that sometimes there will be consequences but you will still be there for them.

MATHS WHIZZ

We are now into our 3rd Term using Maths Whizz and the students and teachers are loving it. Maths Whizz is great because it provides differentiated programmes and each student's needs are continually evaluated and addressed. Next best thing to having their own private teacher!
